HIGHLIGHTS FROM **COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT**

2024 brought a renewed focus on crafting a collection for library patrons that is inspiring, relevant, and diverse. The library added more than 2,000 items during the year across all collections. By analyzing the use of our current holdings, we were able to make thoughtful acquisitions with a particular focus on filling in gaps related to certain topics and viewpoints, and acquiring more current resources on constantly evolving topics, such as technology and politics. We've placed a major focus on books across genres that bring diverse voices to the forefront. One highlight has been the addition of resources providing insight into the Indigenous experience. With displays featuring everything from baseball to kindness, there are always new and exciting discoveries on the shelves. But for those wishing to leave the library with a tried-and-true book in hand, the library has recently purchased many beautiful new editions of classic novels so that our patrons only bring the very best home with them.

NEWS FROM THE WALSH HISTORY CENTER


My name is Wyatt Porter, and I became the Walsh History Center Coordinator in March of 2024. I have been a lifelong resident of the Midcoast and a passionate history buff as far back as I can remember. I graduated from the University of Maine at Farmington in 2015 with a degree in History and have been working at the library since 2018. Ken Gross' retirement after 20 years at the library left some very big shoes to fill, and I feel honored to be entrusted with the stewardship of such an excellent collection of local history.

The diorama of Camden Harbor ca. 1920 remains the reigning champion of reasons to visit the Walsh History Center, with more than 200 people visiting for that purpose.

As part of their exhibit "Magwintegwak: A Legacy of Penobscot Basketry," Farnsworth Museum curators digitized and featured a recorded interview with Penobscot artisan basketmaker Robert Anderson from our collection.


